On Route:

After a brief drivers' meeting to discuss the route and a

few reminders about on-road courtesy, we mounted up and headed out.

The first leg was east out Silver Creek Valley Rd just to get out of the urban area. This led us out to San Felipe Rd which cuts through the hills east of Hwy 101. We then turned west onto Metcalf, past the Metcalf Motorcycle Park, down the steep section to Hwy 101. We paralleled the highway on Malech, which crossing Hwy 101, got us onto Bailey.

We continued on Bailey and then to McKean Rd where we turned right and passed Calero Reservoir. Following McKean we made our way to Almaden Rd and headed south toward New Almaden and then passed Almaden Reservoir. Then a right onto Hicks Rd and a couple of miles to a left onto Mt Umunhum Rd.



page 6 Hot Wheels Launches New Lotus Models Abstracted from a Lotus Press Release

The Lotus Emira sports car and the Evija all-electric hypercar have recently been launched as Hot Wheels toy cars. Dima Shakhmatov, product design manager for Hot Wheels, answers questions about the creative process.

Why did Hot Wheels choose to produce these new Lotus cars?

This is an exciting time for Lotus with the launch of new, fresh, and desirable cars. With its dramatic styling, the Evija is one of the most exciting and visually interesting electric hypercars we've seen. The Emira will be the last Lotus with an internal combustion engine, and it was felt important to mark this by including it in the Mainline.

What is the Mainline?

Mainline is our core range of 1/64 vehicles. These are available widely in toy shops and supermarkets, and they come in the familiar blue-carded blister packs. Within the Mainline there are themed series and both new Lotus cars are in 'Exotics'.




Is this the first Lotus Hot Wheels has created?

No, we have enjoyed a long relationship with the marque. In the 1960s we created a diecast of Lotus' turbine IndyCar, the Type 56. Then in the 1980s, we produced a 'Royal Flash' Lotus Esprit. Since then we have created many more including the Sport Elise, 340R, Evora GT4, two further iterations of Esprit (S1 and V8), as well concept cars including the M250, and the Lotus Concept from the Designer's Challenge series. Lotus is very popular here in our design studio!

How long did it take to create the Emira and Evija, from first sketch to the finished product?

The Hot Wheels team recreated both the Emira and Evija from scratch in our U.S. design studio. We started with some creative ideas, sketches and renders, then CAD design supplied by Lotus, before moving to the 3D printing of initial prototypes ahead of the design sign-off by both our designers and the team at Lotus. Just like in Hethel, once design and engineering are happy, we start making the tooling, and then cars can flow down our own production line. The process took us about a year for each car.

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Any particular challenges with creating the design in small scale?

Our Mainline cars are toys with an RRP of £1.75, so sometimes we have to be creative. It was particularly challenging to capture all the complexity of the Venturi tunnels on the Evjia.

We achieved this using the interior plastic to provide a vibrant contrast. At the rear, the LED lights are very fine, so we have printed these around the tunnel exits. Another challenge is to get this car looking 'just right' at this scale. This is very much an enthusiast's car, and Lotus owners are really passionate, so we did a lot of work to get the form of Evija to look right at 1/64 scale. As such, we had to tweak Lotus' design by elongating or enhancing elements, so the overall look and stance are correct. Evija is such a dramatic car, we wanted to keep as much of that in the model, all within the restraints of it being primarily a toy.

What testing was done with the scale Lotus?

Like all our cars, we track test the prototype Emira and Evija to ensure they will offer high performance just like the real ones! We wanted to keep the sweeping low front overhang and track-hugging splitter of Evija so it's not best suited for our stunt or loop sets. That said, its low, sleek form should make it popular for flat tracks or racing around the living room. And just like the real Emira, this model is a bit more versatile but still should offer high performance.

How did you choose the colour of the car?

For Emira, the colour honours the Seneca Blue car seen at its launch, now with added Black Pack. We also opted for a wheel design that looks a little like the diamond-cut forged alloy wheels available on the full-scale car. For the Evija, we've opted for the iconic colours of green and yellow. It's a Lotus after all!

Hot Wheels isn't necessarily known for EVs. Is it important to have EV models like the Evija for kids and adult collectors?

The automotive world is transitioning rapidly to alternative powertrains. Models such as the Evija offer inspiring performance-oriented electric cars for us to create and enable the current generation to 'own' and 'drive' these aspirational cars. Representation of EVs such as the Evija in our range can show the kids that future cars do offer performance, desirability and sustainability.

Do you need to be a car fan to do your job?

Yes, one needs to be a car fan to the core. It's an important part of our jobs, as we always try to be ahead of design and car culture trends. And we still need to design custom 'builds' in 1/64 scale. All of us are very passionate and are car fans. Also, we have a very mixed international team, so it helps with variety and the global appeal of our toys.

Exciting New Venues Featured as 2023 AutoX Season is Announced

The 2023 GGLC Autocross Season is about to start!

We hope that you all had a nice winter break, and that you are now ready to do some autocrossing. The big news this year is that we have been able to add two new autocross venues! Gone is the Cow Palace, but it is replaced by two new sites: Laguna Seca and Salinas Airport. Please see the accompanying site layouts.

Laguna Seca Lakebed

The Laguna Seca Lakebed area is the parking area between the outsides of Turn 2 and Turn 5. The area is about 200ft wide by 800ft long. Expect courses to be on the tight side, and they will be running from end to end. It is also important to note we will be mandated to adhere to Laguna Seca's 90dB noise limit, so please be mindful of this.

Salinas Airport

Located on the south end of Salinas, the Airport is a popular destination for private aviation.

Please note that the Salinas Airport is a live facility. Access to the site is controlled, so you will not be able to come and go freely.

The autocross area is on the northeast side of the facility, and it consists of a "Pad" that is about 150ft wide and 1100ft long plus a 1900ft long taxiway. There are no noise restrictions.


Class & Rules Changes

There are a few small changes since last year: A combined Lotus Evora and Emira class The Lotus open class is replaced with a Lotus Replica class (which uses the SCCA PAX) A modified points system for the Lotus Elise classes (further details soon) We will follow all local, state, and federal COVID restrictions.

There are 9 points-earning events on the schedule, with an additional school and practice event at Salinas. In order to be eligible for a trophy, you must have participated in at least 2 points events. Don't worry if you cannot attend all the points events as your worst 2 events will be dropped from your season point total.

Our first event is scheduled for Sunday, March 19, at Laguna Seca. Registration should be open by now on motorsportreg.com.

2023 GGLC Lotus/UK Tour—Update #2

This is an update on the GGLC UK Lotus Tour. We are still working to finalize the costs. There has been a delay in pricing the package as we sort out the cost of hiring a van and driver. Those costs have significantly increased since the 2016 tour.

We can, however, share a bit of news about the plans.

When:

September 3-8, 2023

Master Tour Guide:

The GGLC Lotus Tour will be led by Richard Parramint. Richard's involvement with Lotus began in the late 1960s when he worked at the factory as a teen, and it continues today with Classic Team Lotus.

Itinerary (not final):

Group tour that begins at London-Heathrow and... Day 1, collect folks at London, Heathrow and drive to hotel

Day 2, visit Hornsey/ Cheshunt old Lotus factory locations and head to Norfolk

Day 3, visits to:

- Lotus Hethel factory,
 - Classic Team Lotus,
- Ketteringham Hall, East-Carlton Manor,
- Colin and Hazel's final resting place.
- Day 4, possible Lotus track day and/or Lotus Driver Academy on the Hethel Track (optional)
- Lotus Dinner group dinner with friends of the GGLC along with ex and current Lotus folks
- *Day 5*, head to the Goodwood Revival (optional)

This is rough itinerary, which is subject to change. Most likely there will be other "special" things to see and do and people to meet.

Cost:

Final cost is still TBD (our trip in 2016 was \$5600 per couple). The cost will include tour



transportation (while in the UK). Hotel cost are included, but meals are not.

Transportation to and from the UK is not included. You may want to take few extra days on either end of the tour to visit other places in the UK or elsewhere in Europe.

In order to maximize the experience, we are going to try to keep the size to about 12-15 (19 is capacity). All Lotus enthusiasts are invited, however GGLC members and their guests will be given consideration should we reach capacity. Note that, based upon the initial response, we are very close to full.

Exciting Rumors & Options:

September 8–10: Goodwood Revival. Add to the tour at extra cost. GGLC member Chris L. is scheduled to be there driving his Lotus 27. And it is rumored that Lotus will be the featured marque.

September 16–17: Lotus 75th Anniversary Celebration at Hethel. It is rumored that Lotus will have a huge 75th Anniversary Celebration at the factory. Stay an extra week and join the festivities!

So, what do you think? This will be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Excited?
